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The R-4 petitioners were represented by attorney Joseph Bertalan, while the single-family residential petitioners were represented by attorney John Morrison.

City Involved

While all of the disputed area is outside the City of Eureka, the city is concerned because its own General Plan is involved to the extent that any planning within a three mile radius of its limits is required to be referred in the local entity.

Much of the discussion revolved around the proposed General Plan amendment which would provide for commercial development along Myrtle and Harrison Avenues, the main thoroughfares.

Bob Fulda, local realtor whose office is on Myrtle, led a group of approximately 80 petitioners who asked commercial zoning of the entire Myrtle stretch, with a number of professional men asking the same for that portion of Harrison which is adjacent to St. Joseph Hospital, which would allow for full professional structures.

The city's recommendation, which did not actually approve

the amendment but indicated that it could be condoned, was read. Higgins previously expressed the opinion that there are already too many commercial zones outside the city, some of which contain vacant commercial structures and others which have not been developed at all.

There was considerable opposition to the zoning from residents along Myrtle between Lucas and Trinity Streets, who advocated an R-2 zone which would permit duplex housing but which would bar the multi-housing development.

Arguments against the proposed 150 unit multiple medium income housing on seven acres, on grounds are that the entire Worthington area in the county's General Plan is designated for medium density, that streets involved are inadequate to handle the increased traffic, and that the Worthington and Sacred Heart elementary schools would be crowded beyond capacity by the addition of some 125 residents.

A previous effort to have the proposed multi-housing site be zoned to Planned Development was denied by both the Planning Commission and the Board of Supervisors, again because of local opposition.

"It will represent a major discovery completely unanticipated about the moon," Press said. "The prolonged signal, like continuing reverberations from a bell that was rung once, was recorded by the seismometer Thursday after Intrepid crashed onto the moon 45 miles away."

This could mean the moon is neither like earth, which has a molten inner core and hard outer crust, or like a meteor, which is hard as a rock all the way through.

Other scientists were elated by the apparent variety of moon rocks aboard Apollo 12.

Judging from moon-to-earth conversations, Conrad and Bean picked up samples of lunar bed rock and core samples that will give a 28-inch-deep profile of the moon's surface, said Dr. Eugene Shoemaker, consultant on lunar geology to the space agency.

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the recommendation by the Humboldt Medical Center Commission to utilize beds which will become available when modernization of the north wing of the center is completed in December.

This would then leave unoccupied areas in the center which the commission said should be used for long term care.

"This use will assist in filling an unmet need of the area and at the same time will help the Medical Center spread the fixed cost for a more efficient operation," the recommendation said.

Board President E. V. Griffith stated that although a numerical quorum was present at the meeting, actions taken at the session would have to be ratified in writing by the entire membership of the board. Although Humboldt, Del Norte, and Mendocino counties were represented at the meeting, Lake County representatives were absent.

Actions to be submitted for ratification include the amendment of a previous endorsement given to Beverly Enterprises, of Pasadena, to build a 24-bed acute-care psychiatric facility in Eureka. The amendment now makes the previous endorsement contingent upon proper zoning of the land where the proposed facility would be constructed.

Indians Set At Alcatraz

SAN FRANCISCO (AP)

Seventy-eight Indians from about 30 tribes have invaded Alcatraz Island in San Francisco Bay, demanding the federal government turn it over to them under provisions of an 1868 treaty.

The tribesmen crept ashore from boats Wednesday night and vowed Thursday that most would remain until the federal government rules formally on their demands.

Indian leader Richard Oakes, 36, claimed that an 1868 treaty with the Sioux provides that any unused federal land reverts automatically to Indians.

Arson Seen In Car Fire

Fire which may have been of incendiary origin completely destroyed a 1959 two-door sedan owned by Joseph Kelly of 1610 Summer St. late last night in the third of three box alarms answered by city firemen and police in the same area within 30 minutes. The first two were false.

Arriving officers and firemen found the vehicle fully involved in flames.

One witness said he observed a car leave the immediate area at high speed when he went to the scene, and another said he observed a youth run from the area of the second alarm and later heard, but did not see, the speeding vehicle reported by the first.

Deer

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The spokesman reported the deer are scattered and are being taken mostly from areas of heavy brush and heavy timber, with no concentration of deer in any particular areas reported. The spokesman said hunting during the first weekend was hampered by bad weather, and the number of hunters out on weekdays was described as very light, with only about 30 over the entire area.

Over 6,000 applications were received by the DFG prior to the opening of the hunt, but only 600 permits were available. Just over one-sixth of the applications came from Humboldt County residents, and slightly over 100 permits were issued to local people. However, the "county residents are doing better," the spokesman said.

Heavy Patrolling

Some residents were worried that not enough patrols would be made during the hunt, but the department said "OFFIC patrolmen" number about 17, with most of the local property owners on whose land the hunt is being conducted carrying on their own patrolling as well.

The spokesman said the hunt will "alleviate the problem," but he didn't know if the estimated 200-250 deer killed would completely solve the depredation. The hunters were not difficult to deal with, he said, and were generally well-behaved, at the same time commenting on the pretty country of Humboldt County and expressing surprise at the ruggedness of the country.

Klamath Man Changes Plea

CRESCENT CITY — Richard Lee Burdick of Klamath, who had previously pleaded "not guilty by reason of insanity" to each of four criminal counts, withdrew his pleas of insanity and instead pleaded guilty to a charge of battery during an appearance for continued proceedings before Superior Court Judge Frank S. Petersen yesterday.

Following the plea, and on motion of District Attorney Garry Brennan, who said he was offering the motion in the interests of justice, Judge Petersen dismissed the other three counts: assault with a deadly weapon, assault with intent to do great bodily harm, and simple assault. Burdick was represented by Public Defender Philip Schafer.

Specifically, Burdick pleaded guilty to battery, illegally touching or striking a neighbor woman in a Klamath Trailer Court where he lives.
