The success of the SS Manhattan, a huge ice-breaking oil tanker, in becoming the first commercial ship to negotiate the Northwest Passage to Alaska has brought reality to a dream merchant voyagers have cherished for Granada Heights and most of the City Council 500 years.

The historic voyage of the Manhattan. principally financed by the Humble Oil Co., may not prove conclusively that the treacherous northern route is feasible for shipping, but it is certain to reshape world trade patterns that will have profound ramifications in opening the Great North to waterborne

As far back as 1498, when John Cabot sought a route to the fabulous wealth of the East by way of the northern seas, explorers have searched the Northwest Passage as a shortcut to the riches and spices of the Orient. The great trading companies of the 17th century sponsored several attempts to find the route.

Now the treasure isn't spices but oil, the vast supply on Alaska's northern slope. A Northwest Passage open to huge tankers would cut thousands of dollars and miles from the trip around South America or through the Panama Canal.

What the Manhattan has achieved in its epic voyage is more than a realization of a goal sought by sailors for nearly five centuries. A Bia Step Forward

Of all the legislation enacted during the last session of the Legislature and signed into law by Gov. Ronald Reagan, the new California divorce law perhaps stands out as the most liberal and progressive measure in correcting injustices in an area of human relations that too long has been neglected.

Except for incurable insanity, the only grounds for a dissolution of marriage are irreconcilable differences, a term that recognizes that some marriages simply have not worked and cannot be made to work and that there is not necessarily one wholly guilty party and one wholly innocent party to every home to support them, the citizens of the Gramarital breakdown.

In addition to the elimination of the archaic concept of grounds, the new law marks an end to a lucrative source of income for private investigators whose reports no longer will be permitted as evidence. Alimony, one of the worst rackets fostered by divorce laws. will be determined by considering a woman's age, earning ability and the duration of the marriage.

The adversary system, whereby the plaintiff and defendent and their lawyers verbally battle in court, may be the best for most types of litigation, but in divorce cases it only has served to compound the anguish and bitterness already existing between the contending parties. The action of the House Armed Services Committee in adding \$1 billion to the military procurement bill to enable the Navy to build more ships in fiscal 1970 is a heartening indication that responsible members of Congress are aware of the necessity to keep our Navy strong at a time American supremacy of the seas is being challenged.

The tremendous buildup of Russian naval forces in the Mediterranean and the recent warning by Vice Adm. Hyman G. Rickover, USN, that the Soviet Union has embarked on a program which reveals a singular awareness of the importance of sea power and an unmistakable resolve to become the most powerful maritime force in the world are two salient factors that must be recognized in assessing our defense posture.

They would seem to add credence to the observation made by Defense Secretary Melvin Laird that the administration's decision to deactivate more than 100 Navy ships in an economy move "will reduce our capability to meet current commitments." In this context, then, the action of the House Armed Services Committee is significant as to a move toward restoring America's maritime-oriented defense policy.

Probes Serve A Purpose

The disclosure that an extensive investigation into possible fraud among welfare recipients quietly has been under way for the last two months throughout California has heen condemned by critics as an unwarranted invasion of privacy.

Specifically, Peter Sitkin, an attorney for the Neighborhood Legal Assistance Foundation in San Francisco, contends the nature of the probe and the constitutional and statutory questions involved exceed "the narrow issue of the public's right to check into possible welfare fraud.'

The investigation, incidentally, is being conducted on orders of the State Department of Social Welfare by investigators of district attorney's offices who are examining case records of 1,200 randomly selected families throughout the state, including 500 in Northern California and 63 in San Francisco.

We believe investigations such as this, while they may be offensive to some, basically serve a good purpose, particularly if they are conducted discreetly and objectively in ferreting out cases where aid is being given to unqualified recipients, either inadvertently or by design.

The fact that the current probe already has uncovered some instances of fraud among families receiving assistance under the Aid for Families with Dependent Children program in itself would seem to justfy the investigation as well as indicate a need for frequent checks of Granada Heights who so selfishly, and as a safeguard against abuses that can add to the staggering cost of providing aid to the who love and care for four retarded children. indigent. Certainly, a welfare recipient's right to anonymity should not transcend the public's right to take all reasonable means to samure a program for which it is paying is not touched by scandal or dishonesty.

The proposed actions by the County Supervisors with respect to the County Park and Recreation Plan, as reviewed by Mr. Dugald Gillies in his column on Sunday. September 20, do not exactly coincide with the record, especially concerning the Benicia waterfront portion. Mr. Gillies seems under the impression that consideration of this area for park purposes is a new and hastily conceived idea.

On the contrary, Senator Luther Gibson included this land in his proposal for the Benicia State Park for which he worked so hard. Shortage of funds precluded purchase at that time. However, this idea for preservation of waterfront areas for public use was good then and in my opinion still has great merit. Subsequent planners evidently concur because they have included this area for proposed park and recreation use in the Solano County Recreation Plan, the South Solano General Plan and in general plans prepared for Benicia. The BCDC has in its San Francisco Bay Plan recommended that Benicia provide public access, beaches, paths and parks.

The idea is therefore hardly new, and since the area has long been recommended for park development, any Benicia Councilman should have been aware of the fact, and should have working toward the accomplishment of this goal.
